### Tech Tips Photographing Snowdrops

When it comes to kit, a macro lens or tele zoom lens with an extension tube won't be out of place and as you'll most likely be working close to the ground try to preview your shots with the help of Live View if you find that getting your eye close to the viewfinder is difficult. A tripod's always useful when shooting macro work and a waterproof sheet, mat or gardener's kneeling pad will make the experience of working on damp ground slightly more comfortable.

Ideally, you need to be working at the same height as the snowdrops so be prepared for sitting or kneeling on the damp ground. To get you even closer to the flower heads you'll need to splay the legs on your tripod and, if you can, move the centre column from vertical to horizontal as this will get you closer to the ground. As well as making use of Live View, switch on the camera's self-timer or use your cable /remote release to help keep your shots shake-free. Once you're set-up, you'll find you need a small f/stop to get good depth-of-field, which means you need a long exposure and when you look through the viewfinder or use your Live View, you'll notice how the smallest of breezes will blow the flower which when mixed with slower shutter speeds, will create blur. Try using a simple piece of wire to keep the flower still or you could just wait patiently for the wind to settle down.

If you find a particularly good specimen that doesn't have anything distracting in the background or foreground, throw the background out of focus, keeping the flower sharp. Take this one step further and completely cut out the steam, leaving the viewer's focus completely on the head of the flower. If the background looks a little too empty try positioning yourself so another Snowdrop sits in the background which you can blur out of focus. For group shots, try to pick out two or three for the centre of your image then create an out of focus frame with the surrounding snowdrops.

As you won't be the only one entering photography themed contests, having knowledge that keeps you one step in front of others who enter is always handy to have and that's where our friends <u>COOPH</u> join the conversation. Over on their YouTube channel, they've got a new video that covers the 'POP' principle on winning photography competitions. 'POP' stands for **P**lan, **O**rganise and **P**osition and the video features the two-time winner of the Red Bull Illume action and adventure sports photography contest, <u>Lorenz Holder</u>.

**Plan** - Don't arrive in a location too late to capture the 'winning' shot, know when a place will be at its absolute best so you can take full advantage of it.

Organise - Not all shoots can be planned and sometimes, you're in a location only once or you may find time isn't on your side so you have to make the most of the opportunity in front of you. Lorenz found himself in this situation on a shoot in Germany where what would be a beautiful image of a bridge, river and surrounding trees was spoilt by the hundreds of leaves that had fallen on the water's surface. Lorenz happened to have a giant fishing net in his car so with the help of Senad Grosic, they used the fishing net to collect all of the leaves so the water was left beautifully clear.

**Position** - Where you capture a photo from and the framing can make or break a photograph so do take the time to think about angles and other key image components before hitting the shutter. A little pre-planning never hurts either, something Lorenz did for this particular shoot.

The image Lorenz captured was used in over 300 magazines so his efforts were well worth it in the end, even if Senad didn't agree at the time!
